

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Message from the Executive Director

2024 was an exciting year for the RES during which we continued to broaden the reach of our educational programming. We welcomed two new Field School Coordinators, Hannah Richards and Derek Zandvliet and are looking forward to a full schedule of programming in Tofino, Ucluelet, Ahousaht and Bamfield. We take our mandate to serve our regional community to heart!

On the adult education front our winter Speaker Series is in full swing and we've been thrilled to see old friends and new ones too zooming in from all across BC (and even as far away as Yukon and Alberta). The West Coast Ambassador Program is gearing up for yet another year, and we are looking ahead to a full slate of Raincoast Institute Courses in 2024, many of them already booking up. Birds, Seaweeds and Mushrooms are returning and this year we are adding two new courses: Marine Mammals and Marine Invertebrates! Our research and monitoring activities continue on as well, and we are eagerly anticipating the first couple of peer-reviewed papers to come out of our work with Black Oystercatchers and Western Sandpipers over the last several years. We are also expanding our collaboration with BC Nature to conduct marine bird surveys in Hesquiaht Harbour this spring, a first for us!

On a final note, I am proud to share that as of 2024 the RES is a Living Wage Employer. The strength of our organization has always been our staff and we firmly believe that the more we can invest in our people, the more they will invest in us and help accomplish our mission, uphold our mandate, and continue to make a meaningful contribution to the community we are all a part of.



Our Mission

"To shape an environmentally sustainable future for the Clayoquot and Barkley Sound region through education and community stewardship."

We seek to accomplish our mission by delivering a broad range of high-quality educational and research programs, such as field school, speaker series, summer camps, school programs, events, and research programs focused on the natural environment, cultures, and communities of the Clayoquot and Barkley Sound region.





Our Aim

Our aim is to enable citizens within and beyond the Clayoquot and Barkley Sound region to participate knowledgeably, effectively and responsibly in the work of shaping this future for our region and for our planet.

We work with a broad range of public, private and community institutions and agencies, both within and beyond the region, to establish and maintain a high-caliber education and research network and to reflect a wide range of perspectives in all of our educational and research activities.



2024 Research Overview

The RES is actively involved in a number of scientific research and monitoring projects in Clayoquot and Barkley Sound. Our work in this field may sometimes go under the radar, but it's an important part of our mission. As a regional organization, our priority has always been to learn more about our local environment and use that information to raise awareness and promote stewardship. Much of our work over the last several years has focused on collecting baseline data that can be used to assess the health of our marine ecosystem. Whether it's learning more about what salmon in Barkley Sound eat in the summer or what kinds of birds congregate in the Tofino Mudflats in the winter, the idea is to target gaps in data or knowledge and collect information that can inform conservation and management decisions.

Since 2020, we have been collaborating with the Juanes Lab at UVic on The BC Adult Salmon Diet Program - the first scientific attempt to assess how the diet of Coho and Chinook salmon differs between seasons and between regions up and down the entire BC coast.



Birds have always been of particular interest to us here at the RES. One of our most productive ongoing collaborations is with BC Nature, an organization leading the way identifying areas of special ecological importance and pushing for their conservation and appreciation. With generous financial support from their team, we have been able to conduct several multi-year efforts to survey marine birds all around Vancouver Island. The data we collect directly informs how areas of conservation priority are assessed and helps provide updated information on populations and distribution that can help us better understand how various species are trending over time.

2024 Research Projects

Marine Bird Surveys:

Surveyed Barkley Sound to assess diversity and abundance of marine birds in the fall. This work applies the same protocol we employed over multiple years in Queen Charlotte Strait and is already being used by our partners at BCNature to update estimates for a number of key species in the region.



Salmon Diet Study:

Collected 129 coho and chinook salmon stomachs which will be analysed by researchers at UVic to reveal how diet varies between years and between areas at sites all along the BC coast.

We also submitted three papers for peerreview detailing our work on:

- Black Oystercatcher diet in Barkley Sound (accepted).
- Western Sandpiper migration in the Tofino Mudflats (accepted).
- Seabird surveys in Queen Charlotte Strait (in press).









2024 WCAP

Our long-running *West Coast Ambassador Program* aims to build a strong and healthy community, encourage a positive attitude, and foster responsible citizenship while improving community relations between visitors and local businesses. Since the Covid-19 pandemic, we have transitioned to 95% in-person leaving virutal behind.

During spring, these 2 to 3-hour evening sessions welcomed regional residents of all ages and backgrounds to participate in this educational, engaging, and free initiative to expand their knowledge of both Clayoquot and Barkley Sound and increase their participation in our communities.

In response to the constantly evolving environmental and economic landscape, our courses provided participants with local information and covered important topics such as seasonal concerns, regional hazards, and coexisting with wildlife.

In 2024, we were happy to hold the "Small-Town, Big Picture: Tofino" course at the historic Monks (Načiks) property, a time capsule of Tofino's past.

2024 Raincoast Institute

In 2024, we offered five Raincoast Institute courses: Birds of the West Coast, Marine Mammals of the West Coast, Seaweeds of the West Coast, Invertebrates of the West Coast and Mushrooms of the West Coast. Each weekend field course provided participants with a holistic understanding of our diverse ecosystems, and offered hands-on, outdoor-based learning experiences.

In March, Marine Mammals of the West Coast covered the life history, ecology and behaviour of the better known species, the history of their exploitation and current conservation status.

In May, Birds of the West Coast explored the exceptional birding opportunities along the Pacific Flyway.

In June, Seaweeds of the West Coast introduced participants to the world of coastal seaweeds, covering biodiversity, collection, identification, foraging, and the relationship between seaweeds and people.

In July, Marine Invertebrates of the West Coast learning of strategies that they use to survive the rigors of the intertidal zone; their varied and often bizarre means of reproduction,

In October, Mushrooms of the West Coast delved into the realm of west coast fungi, addressing their role in forests, essential collection and identification methods, and practical aspects such as edibility, medicinal properties, and culinary uses.






2024 Speaker Series



Imagine walking through an old-growth forest the cool, damp air, the soft moss underfoot, the smell of cedar and spruce—the silence. This quiet stillness belies a frenzy of activity just out of sight. Despite being dominated by relatively few species of trees and plants, coastal temperate rainforests are extraordinarily biodiverse. The relatively low rate of decay allows for the accumulation of huge amounts of organic material, home to a teeming community of organisms... if you know where to look. As humans, we are in the habit of looking out, looking up, looking around—but when was the last time you looked beneath your feet?

Our series brought world-renowned scientists into the living rooms of hundreds of participants.


Wild Pacific Trail






